## NC Pottery Center in Seagrove, NC, Offers Two New Exhibitions

The North Carolina Pottery Center in Seagrove, NC, is presenting two new exhibitions including: *SOMETHING'S AFOOT*, featuring footed pottery pieces, on view in the Center's Main Gallery, through Dec. 15, 2024 and *HUMBLE COMPONENTS*, an exhibit illustrating the simple components which go into the creation of pottery works, on view in the Center's Back Gallery, through Dec. 15, 2024.

Footed pottery pieces, sometimes even having literal feet, have a rich history dating back thousands of years and have been found at archaeological sites in ancient Mesopotamia, Egypt, Greece, Rome, China, Mesoamerica, and Medieval & Renaissance Europe, as well as other places. Adding feet or stands to pottery pieces emerged over time for various reasons, including increased functionality, cultural and religious symbology, ceremonial purposes, and enhanced aesthetics. Today, footed pottery continues to be crafted by artisans worldwide, both as functional objects and works of art.

Our *Something's Afoot* show will feature footed pieces by fourteen of our state's wonderful potters! For this show, "footed" means having two or more points of contact with the ground.

The exhibition *HUMBLE COMPO-NENTS*, shows that when you break it down (not literally!), pottery, the product of a craft that likely originated independently in multiple regions around the world thousands of years ago and continues to be practiced in North Carolina today, is really just composed of humble components - clay and various minerals and elements.

In our *Humble Components* show, you'll see old and contemporary pieces representing various North Carolina traditions and

techniques: Native American pit-fired, slip-decorated redware, salt-glazed, alkaline-glazed, wood ash-glazed, Chinese blue, crystalline, and chrome red, next to samples of the humble components from which some of those pieces were made.

The North Carolina Pottery Center is a dynamic and engaging place where people of all backgrounds, ages, and interests discover the beauty and the stories behind North Carolina's world-class clay culture.

We are the first stop for visitors arriving in Seagrove and a place to which people will return to learn about North Carolina pottery. Visitors enjoy the beauty of our campus and are delighted by our interior spaces. We provide them with information about ceramic artists in the local area and throughout the state, and we are a gateway through which visitors enhance their appreciation of North Carolina's clay culture.

We tell these stories through excellent exhibitions and visual and participatory multimedia, as well as by providing experiential and educational opportunities. Our research and documentation focus on the concepts and themes necessary to support our exhibitions and programming, deepening our understanding of our state's clay culture.

We are conscientious advocates for North Carolina's potters and North Carolina pottery.

This exhibition will later travel to the Mt. Airy Museum of Regional History from Aug.-Oct., 2024.

In 1963, a group of friends and acquaintances gathered around a kitchen table to discuss their love of crafts. From that first conversation came Piedmont Craftsmen - a guild of crafts artists and crafts collectors whose devotion to the handmade object and ties to the heritage of craft work in the region have spanned several generations. At its beginning, Piedmont Craftsmen created the guidelines for a juried exhibiting membership, educated the public to fine crafts

and offered an annual crafts fair to meet the mission of promoting and selling members' works. The guild has expanded its mission, over its 50+ year history.
