On Our Cover This Month

On our cover is a work by Patsy Tidwell-Painton, which is part of the exhibition, Ebb and Flow of Life's Journey, on view at the Lowcountry Artists Gallery in Charleston, SC, from July 1 - 31, 2024. A reception will be held on July 5, from 5-8pm. Read the article on Pages 6 & 7.

Patsy Tidwell-Painton represents an institution in Charleston for the visual art community having run and owned Tidwell Art Center and Gallery, located on King Street for many years, supplying the art needs of Charleston's artists. Patsy was an early and often supporter of Charleston Arts and then Carolina Arts. Her store was one of the best distribution sites for our publication when it was printed. I bet she has a lot of stories she could tell about the Charleston visual art community and its artists.

July 1987

It was the month of July 1987 when we published our first issue of Charleston Arts. We waited until after the Spoleto and Piccolo Spoleto Festivals were over to start our journey. Back then, Spoleto was doing major visual art exhibits and it would have been too much to handle in a first issue.

As we enter our 38th year with Carolina Arts, Spoleto doesn't include any visual arts - how things change. Eventually Piccolo Spoleto picked up the staff of offering major exhibits, but then that faded. Now, the City of Charleston's Office of Cultural Affairs can't even let us know what exhibits they might offer by the time our deadlines have passed.

In between, we published Berkeley County Arts, South Carolina Arts and eventually in 1997, we became *Carolina Arts*. We're now in our 28th year of publishing Carolina Arts. First, as a printed publication and then after

2010, as an online only publication.

Some folks miss the printed version of the publication, some still claim to have seen it recently, but I don't miss the printed version at all. It was mostly in black & white, small in size (never more than 30 pages) and only covered the areas where we received advertising support. It was costly to print, costly to distribute, and was only offered in the areas we covered.

When we stopped printing Carolina Arts I thought it would be the end of our publication. We stopped because of the recession and rising gas prices. But I was wrong, producing an online publication had its benefits. We only had to produce one copy and launch it in cyberspace and anyone, anywhere, could download it for free. We could send out e-mails to followers letting them know a new issue is ready to download. They could send it to folks on their e-mail lists. Social media also offered a way to distribute the publication.

As an online publication, we are in full color, we have unlimited size, and anyone around the world can download a copy - as long as they know about us, and more folks find out about us every month.

I do miss the traveling around the Carolinas, although it was mostly at night to make it easier to distribute, but I did get to see some art galleries and some of the art centers and art museums. Today, most of my time is spent on computers. Most folks communicate with us by e-mail - post cards announcing exhibits is a thing of the past - they're too slow and carry little info compared to what can be sent by e-mail.


Charleston Artist Guild in Charleston, SC, Offers Works by Fairoozan Abdullah
