into the depths of his subconscious, where dreams intertwine with reality. His process begins with a drawing that evolves into a vibrant canvas, filled with bold colors that echo the intensity of his dreams. This exhibit showcases the personal and intimate nature of his self-expression, allowing viewers to glimpse into his innermost thoughts and feelings.

Collichio's passion for art was ignited at a very young age. He recalls being deeply inspired by his art teacher, Mr. Eades, who introduced him to the works of Salvatore Dali and Picasso during a sabbatical in Spain. This influence is evident in Collichio's bold, dreamlike, and sometimes irrational paintings, which he describes as liberating

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born a slave in Beaufort and became a Civil War hero and Congressman. A bust of Small is also on the church grounds.

Craven Street is steep in history. The old Beaufort Arsenal home of the Chamber of commerce's visitor's center and the Beaufort history Museum is a block east of the church. To the west is the Secession House, site of many informal discussions and formal meetings during the 1850's to discuss withdrawal from the Union.

country," Collichio finds joy in an active A Harriet Tubman Monument Has | Works by Samantha Claar **Been Installed at Tabernacle** Baptist Church in Beaufort, SC

The Tabernacle Baptist Church has installed a Harriet Tubman Monument, created by sculptor Ed Dwight, located on the church grounds at 901 Craven Street in

"This has been a long time coming. I still remember telling the church on Sunday morning in June 2016, which was around the anniversary of the Combahee River Raid, that we were going to build a monument for Harriet Tubman," said Kenneth F. Hodges, pastor of Tabernacle Baptist Church. "Our church is no stranger to preserving history, as our members got together and drafted a resolution thanking Abraham Lincoln for freeing us after the signing of the Emancipation Proclamation Jan. 1, 1863; that document is a part of the Abraham Lincoln papers. We also undertook the monument to Robert Smalls, and now we are preserving the history of Harriet Tubman right here in Beaufort."

Sculptor Ed Dwight's 14-foot-tall bronze sculpture will sit on church's grounds, where it is believed to be the church where Mrs. Tubman made a speech after the Combahee River Raid where contraband known as enslaved African men were inspired to become members of the colored regiment. The church raised nearly \$1,000,000 to complete the project, as they received donations from the faith community, individuals, and businesses. The project took 8 years to complete.

Pastor Hodges continued, "It took five Page 8 - Carolina Arts, July 2024

years to raise the funds and three years to complete the sculpture. It was a hard sell because most people never heard the story of Harriet Tubman being in Beaufort. Everywhere we went, we told the story overand-over again about her presence here and finally historians started to tell the story."

The monument commemorates the time Mrs. Tubman spent in Beaufort, SC, which is often left out of her story. History states Mrs. Tubman lived in Beaufort for approximately two years arriving in Spring 1862 based on orders from Massachusetts Gov. John Andrews, who thought she could be used as a spy, as she was a member of the New England Freedmen's Aid Society, an organization whose mission was to provide teachers and other aid for "the industrial, social, intellectual, moral, and religious improvement" of freedmen.

While in Beaufort, SC, she aided freed women teaching them how to run businesses such as selling food and doing the laundry of the Union soldiers, all while Mrs. Tubman held jobs as a nurse, scout, and cook. Her role in the Combahee River Raid in June 1863, under Col. James Montgomery, for which she freed 756 enslaved Africans is most notable.

A sculpture depicting Harriet Tubman's heroic ventures will sit next to the 156 year old church on Craven Street in downtown Beaufort. Tabernacle Baptist is also the burial place of Robert Smalls, who was

The Art League of Hilton Head on Hilton Head Island, SC, will present Painting the Stories: Glimpses of Gullah by Samantha Claar, on view in the Art League Gallery, from July 23 through Aug. 23, 2024. A reception will be held on July 24, from 5-7pm. Claar will also host a Gallery Walk on July 25, at 11am, where she will discuss her work, influences, and processes. The exhibit, reception and gallery walk are free and open to the public.

The boldly colored paintings, often painted on recycled or salvaged materials, are inspired by Claar's dreams or "nighttime roamings." "They visited and demanded that I paint what they were show ing me...We argued about this for a long time because I had never painted a human figure...but they were very sure. That is how my love for the Gullah-Geechee and their unique culture was born."

Claar is a self-taught artist who began painting in her 40s. She joined the art scene on Tybee Island in the 1990s, where she opened a gallery with a friend. Once she began dreaming of the Gullah-Geechee and their stories, she educated herself about the people and their history so she could better "paint the stories" and, in turn, educate the people who visited her gallery and had a desire to know more. In 2012, she opened Fine Folk Galleries, the first Gullah art market in Savannah's City Market.

Claar celebrates the Southern lifestyle that can be traced back to Gullah contributions. The cities were built with their labor, their foods, their knowledge of the sea and tide, of fishing methods and sustainable use of land and sea. "Trace our 'Southern roots' and there you find the G-G as the root system that made it all possible," she says.

"I want you to take this with you: Wow! I never realized, assimilated, or understood just how much my life was impacted by the introduction of the Gullah-Geechee and the rich, vibrant culture that they crafted in the midst of unspeakable conditions...While looking at my work: I want you to experience the joy of being a fellow human these remarkable people."

Art League of Hilton Head is the only 501(c)(3) nonprofit visual arts organization on Hilton Head Island with a synergistic art gallery and teaching Academy. Art League Academy welcomes artists and students in all media at all skill levels, including true beginners.
