

Greenville County Museum of Art in Greenville, SC, Features Works by Ashley Norwood Cooper

The Greenville County Museum of Art (GCMA) in Greenville, SC, is presenting an exhibit of works by Ashley Norwood Cooper, on view through Sept. 8, 2024.

Born and raised in Greenville, SC, Ashley Norwood Cooper (born 1970) received her BA from the University of Georgia, where she majored in Latin. She taught Latin for a time before moving to Bloomington, Indiana, where she earned her MFA in Painting from Indiana University in 2000.

Cooper's work depicts intimate, middleclass life in vibrant colors applied with bold, expressive brushstrokes. Optimistic and hopeful, her scenes of seeming domestic tranquility also hint at the unpredictability and fragility of family life and community. Informed by Abstract Expressionism, her large-scale figurative paintings have been the subjects of numerous solo and group exhibitions in the United States. Considered the premier American art museum in the South, the GCMA is home to the world's largest public collection of watercolors by iconic American artist Andrew Wyeth. The GCMA also has an impressive collection of paintings and prints by contemporary artist Jasper Johns.

Inspired by the Italian term, sottobosco, which translates to "undergrowth" or

"underbrush" in English, Greenville native, Bess Whittington will release *Wondrous Wild* in August. As reflected in the surfaces of her mixed media pieces, sottobosco refers to the dense, diverse layers of vegetation found on the forest floor, beneath its canopy. This layer is characterized by a rich tapestry of small plants, shrubs, herbs, fungi, mosses, and decaying organic mat-

Whittington's work contains a variety of processes including collagraph printmaking, woodworking, and sculpting. "The inspiration for this collection comes from the countless hours spent exploring my father's garden, where every leaf, flower, and creature seemed to tell a story," Whittington shares. "I wanted to create a space where viewers could experience that same sense of wonder and curiosity, inviting them to find and treasure encounters of their own."

Visitors will find themselves immersed in a world where the delicate interplay of light and shadow brings flora and fauna to vivid life, capturing the essence of the sottobosco.
