Bailey Mennetti offered the following statement, "I am a passionate artist who wields graphite on 100% cotton paper as my chosen medium. I began enduring my passion through art classes at a very young age to further my skill. I was accepted into Rollings Middle School of the Arts where I focused heavily on art as my core class. During high school, I completed advanced placement art courses, which fueled my desire to pursue my passion."

"My artistic journey continued at the renowned Savannah College of Art and Design, where I honed my skills and cultivated a deep appreciation for the power of visual storytelling," adds Mennetti. "I graduated with a Bachelors of Fine Arts with a major in illustration. My artistic focus is brought to life through the delicate strokes of graphite creating an artistic dance between light and shadow. I have found an endless passion where I have discovered comfort, joy, and purpose. Bailey was born and raised in South Carolina, currently living in Denver, Colorado."

Sunny Mullarkey McGowan is a fine artist residing in Greenville, SC. Growing up in the sea islands of the Lowcountry in Beaufort, SC, McGowan was accepted into the Governor's School for the Arts for Visual Art in high school. She later attended Anderson College and the University of South Carolina. She now resides in Greenville, SC, with her husband and three

McGowan's body of work includes the mediums of printmaking, painting, mixed media, and mural painting. She creates fine art pieces in her studio located in the arts district of the Village of West Greenville, and has completed several murals around the city of Greenville, expanding into Spartanburg and Anderson.

Her work has been displayed in exhibits in Georgia, Florida, and both North and South Carolina, and locally exhibited in events in partnership with the Metropolitan Arts Council and Artisphere. In the summer of 2020, McGowan was selected to paint a mural in Nashville by the The Women's Suffrage Centennial Commission (WSCC), to celebrate the 19th Amendment's 100 year anniversary. The mural was painted live in Nashville, TN, in Centennial Park, then displayed at the Hermitage Hotel, and then installed permanently in the WorkHouse Arts Center as a permanent feature at the historical site.

"Constant curiosity helps me discover and create fanciful, abstract worlds, and gives a passion to my work to experimentally recreate a sense of purposeful chaos seen from unexpected perspectives," says McGowan. "I create boldly colored and textured designs that flow playfully through movement and invite you to explore the vibrant layers within each piece. I cultivate art that ignites your imagination and moves you to feel the spark of curiosity and life within you."



The Tryon Fine Arts Center in Tryon, NC, is presenting an exhibition of works by the late Phyllis Allen Eifert, featuring paintings, drawings, bronze and paper mache sculptures, on view in the JP Gallery, through Sept. 14, 2024.

Beloved Tryon artist Phyllis Allen Eifert (1932-2018) left an indelible mark that still captivates audiences. Her pieces reflect

ence as a mother, particularly since the birth of her son Samuel in 2017. Her pursuit of an MFA degree at the University of South Carolina marked a pivotal moment in her artistic evolution, catalyzing a shift from 2-D painting to large-scale textile installations.

During her residency, Sheridan has immersed herself in the creation of a series of "womb rooms" using crocheted textiles, which will be featured in her upcoming exhibition at 701 CCA. These rooms will serve as a labyrinth within the gallery space, inviting visitors to engage in a tactile exploration of maternal identity. Through interactive sculpture, audio, and light, each room will offer a unique sensory experience, reflecting Sheridan's profound narrative on the journey of motherhood.

We've each been given talents to help others and mine is not only to paint, but to break it down step-by-step and demonstrate in a patient, methodical way how to do it. It's taken me many years and much brush mileage to reach the place where I am confident in my artwork and it 'has a voice.'

Peaceful, serene and calm landscapes are my subjects. When I pick up a brush, put on soft background music, I go to a better place; not in this world, but on canvas."

Patricia Vincent Sharp offered the following statement, "Color is important in everything I do; it reflects who I am. I'm attracted to bold, primary colors and enjoy painting nature and animals especially. We never stop learning and developing in our creative journey and I always have a painting in the works. It gives me great pleasure *continued above on next column to the right*  evocative and sometimes whimsical creativity that refuses to settle for a single form of expression. It is said that when you experience Eifert's work, you are reminded that art is not conceived in a moment, but is the result of decades of study, hours of practice, trial and error, and passion that pours forth in her work.

For Eifert, the world of horses has played a major role for the past sixty years. Born in Lynchburg, VA, in 1932, Eifert began to ride at the age of six. On Pearl Harbor day, Dec. 7, 1941, after taking riding lessons and attending lectures and a clinic given by Capt. Vladimir S. Littauer she rode in one of her first horse shows. According to the artist, "From then on whenever there was an opportunity she hunted with the Bedford County Hounds and showed her horse in local horse shows".

After graduating from high school Eifert went to Penn Hall in Chambersburg, PA, and majored in Art History. It was there that she gained experience riding under the coaching of Fritz Kleeman who taught Littauer's method. During this time, after

schooling everyday, Eifert showed in inter-collegiate shows, hunted with Plunket Stewart's Cheshire Hounds and rode in the Harrisburg National.

After receiving her BFA, she continued her art education at Moore Institute of Art, The Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts and the Barnes Foundation. At this time horses were not in the picture and it was not until after she was married that she was given a gift of a lovely three year old gelding from her husband. There was a lot of work for her to bring this "green horse" along and she needed help from a professional. Living, at the time, in Bedford, NY, there were quite a few good horsemen from which to choose.

Each week Eifert would van her horse to Cedar Lodge Farm in Connecticut and take lessons from Hugo-Vidal. The excellent schooling under a well-known trainer paid <u>continued on Page 18</u>

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
