It features the work of Michael Cunningham, Donald Furst, Claude Howell, Hobson Pittman, Robert Postma, Richard Stenhouse, Caroline Von Glahn, Virginia Wright-Frierson, and others.

**Exhibition Artist Highlights:** 

Claude Howell (American, 1915 –1997) was born in Wilmington and was one of North Carolina's most notable artists, with an artistic career spanning almost seven decades. A brilliant colorist and meticulous draftsman, he is best known for his intimate examination of the southern coast: the quality of light and life of its people. Cameron Art Museum owns over 40 of his works as well as personal journals and effects he bequeathed. His generous posthumous donation allowed the institution to establish the Claude Howell Endowment for the Purchase of North Carolina Art which continues to add important works by North Carolina artists to the museum's permanent collection.

Virginia Wright-Frierson (American, b. 1949) is a painter, an award-winning children's book author and illustrator. She is also a large-scale public installation artist. Her projects include Wilmington's Airlie Garden's 2004 bottle chapel inspired by local visionary artist Minnie Evans, 1892 – 1987. Wright-Frierson was also selected as the artist to paint the ceiling mural (she chose to create images of evergreen trees reaching for sunlight) installed at Columbine High School in Littleton, CO.

Recently retired, Donald Furst (American, b. 1953) was a professor of art at the University of North Carolina Wilmington who came to the faculty in 1985. He specialized in mezzotint and other forms of intaglio printmaking. His works have been displayed nationally and across the world, from Canada to Egypt to Russia, and have been featured at the renown International Print Triennial in Krakow, Poland and the Sapporo International Print Biennial in Japan. Furst's work has been featured in multiple exhibitions at St. John's Museum of Art (now the Cameron Art Museum, Wilmington NC) including Donald Furst: Eighteen Years of Printmaking, 1992, and Quintet: Five Print Suites by Donald Furst,

This exhibition is a traveling counterpart of the similarly themed *Close to Home* exhibition Cameron Art Museum is organizing and hosting, on view Nov. 17, 2024 through Mar. 23, 2025. Cameron Art Museum opens this exhibition with *Close to Home CAM Gala 2024*, a benefit at the museum on Nov. 16, 2024. It will feature music, a live auction, dancing, creative cuisine and craft cocktails from CAM Cafe and more. All proceeds go to support Cameron Art Museum and the work they do.

Both Home in the Cape Fear: Selected Works from Cameron Art Museum, Wilmington, NC, and Close to Home celebrate Cameron Art Museum's extensive collection and vital connections to the state, the


Each of the four large-scale pieces installed in Cameron Art Museum's Hughes Wing engage the belief systems and symbols that underpin the ideals of church, nation, and creation. Made of materials that include tar, smoke, fabric gowns, gunshots, welding material, earth and fire, these works invite visitors to draw close and experience the messiness of making, and by analogy, to bear witness to the ways that life invades, entangles, and tarnishes us. Inspired by the artist's own personal spiritual journey, *Thomas Sayre: Four Walls* invites visitors to contemplate their own place in the world.

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Sayre sculpts, paints, and produces commissioned work. His art is housed in collections across the globe from Thailand to Tennessee. He has exhibited his work in a number of private galleries and public museums, including Cheryl Hazan Gallery in Manhattan and the Contemporary Art Museum and the North Carolina Museum of Art, both in Raleigh, NC. In 1995, Sayre received a National Endowment for the Arts Fellowship. In 2014, he was awarded an honorary Doctor of Fine Arts from North Carolina State University.

Art in Bloom Gallery in Wilmington, NC, will present *Endless Skies*, featuring new works by Joanne Geisel, on view from Aug. 2 through Sept. 8, 2024. A reception will be held on Aug. 4, from 2-5pm.

Geisel states, "In our daily lives, we get caught up in routines and therefore limit our awareness of the possibilities. On the other hand, looking at skies can be transforming, as they can be limitless in their expansiveness, colors, and the endless formation of clouds, and through them we feel we can go beyond our limitations and even time and space. The oceans, lakes, and marshes express other dimensions of the landscapes and ourselves."

"My love of drawing and painting began as a child which led to choosing a bachelor's degree in art education where I could take a broad array of studio courses and then I continued with graduate courses to become permanently certified to teach in New York State," adds Geisel. "I later received a master's in public administration. My careers were in human services and higher education, where I used my creative and problem-solving skills in program development and management, marketing,

community outreach, and career and educational counseling."

"Upon moving to North Carolina in 2005, I focused on becoming a full-time artist; painting, teaching, exhibiting, and selling my artwork. My goals in creating oil paintings include capturing the feelings, sights and sounds of my subject. I continue to experiment with texture, edges, brush-strokes, and palette knife and the layering of color to create depth, luminosity, and beauty."
