inspirational starting points for my gourd sculptures."

Her gourd pieces feature trees, flowers, birds, fish, and many other life forms that have inspired her work for more than thirty years. "They seem to fit very comfortably on a natural gourd 'canvas.' "I love the idea of nest-building, and have used found materials such as leather, twigs, and hemp to create stylized nests perched at the tops of some of my pieces." Intertwined lives, vines, nests, relationships...the opportunities for inspiration have been rich!

Photography was painter Ryann Carey's first love as an artistic medium. Her love of observation provides the inspiration to capture moments, first on camera, and then in her paintings. "I strive to paint the representational world converged with the emotional response that it elicits. The Arts Council of Wayne County in Goldsboro, NC, is presenting Tales Among Old Threads, featuring a solo exhibition of works by Wonky Star Studios' Greg Hausler, on view through Aug. 23, 2024. A reception will be held on Aug. 2, from 6-8pm, and Lunch with the Artist will be offered on Aug. 10, from 12:30-1:30pm. Hausler offers the following statement, "I paint on canvases composed of discarded clothing, fabric scraps, and found objects, then layer them with obscene amounts of latex paint. It's my nature to squeeze every ounce of usefulness out of everything I own, like using an old tshirt I love but is too worn to wear. Even the paint I use is often mis-tints or the dregs of cans and tubes. I think about the theme for the work only after the textiles have bonded to the canvas. The challenge of painting on an uneven surface helps push the creative process into unexpected directions. This technique is something I have been refining since the 1980s." The Cary Art Center in Cary, NC, is presenting Shared Experiences: Making the Invisible Visible, a solo exhibition of fiber art by Christine Hager-Braun, on view through Aug. 24, 2024. The inspiration for these fiber art pieces is rooted in the artist's own history but more so in the stories shared by others about their experiences with mental health problems, chronic illness, or invisible disabilities.
